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"It occurred after school hours," Ladner said Monday. Anytime any student of ours is involved in an accident, we are certainly concerned. We hate to see anything like this happen.

LIGHTHOUSE: Animal encounters happen Wednesdays

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in "the little Lighthouse" down the highway from The Zoo on U.S. Highway 98.

After Hurricane Ivan in 2004, Morris realized three of the four pre-schools in the area closed. She got the idea - or as she would call it, 'inspiration' - to start a school incorporating Montessori principles in Gulf Breeze. But even though she had a master's degree in business and owns an auditing company, she discovered she needed more college training to get the child-care credentials to start a school. So she went back to school and earned a degree in Montessori teaching, as well as getting her other child-care credentials.

She started the Lighthouse day-care program in 2005 with 18 students, using the fellowship hall at the Concord PCA Church

in Midway.

"Then I bought four acres in Midway and built the little Lighthouse school for our day care and pre-school program," she explained. "Since 2005, we have now grown to 180 students, including our Voluntary Pre-K and pre-school still in that little Lighthouse building. The elementary school is here at The Zoo."

The school has received the accreditation of Christians Schools of Florida, as well as most recently national accreditation.

"All our teachers are certified, and we follow the Bob Jones daily curriculum. The students take the Iowa Standardized tests yearly instead of the FCAT test," Morris explained.

Lighthouse Private Christian Academy currently serves students from kindergarten

through fourth grade at The Zoo.

"We are connected to The Zoo property, and we pay rent to The Zoo and can use the entire Zoo property when we want to," Morris said. "But we have a separate address from The Zoo. We put about \$100,000 in renovations into The Zoo property this year before we opened the school - including clearing an overgrown area to make a state-of-the-art playground."

Every week the students look forward to Wild Wednesdays, when each class has an animal encounter scheduled with Zoo staff and each class takes a train ride through The Zoo.

Students also have one day of art class and another day of music. They also have PE classes. There also is Friday Chapel. Programs are outlined on the school's Web site at www.lighthousepca.com

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you can't do those two things, it's not feasible."

Holley-Navarre Chief Ron Norton and Navarre Beach Chief Mike Howard have been invited to the Nov. 11 Midway Fire District Commission meeting to offer their input.

Midway currently has 21 fulltime firefighters who staff two fire stations and provide fire and emergency service to 26 square miles between Gulf Breeze and Navarre. Holley-Navarre has four stations and 12 paid firefighters who help protect 50 square miles. Navarre Beach has one station with six paid firefighters who are responsible for a four-mile stretch of Santa Rosa Island.

Volunteer firefighters also provide important assistance to each department.

"We're open to exploring the feasibility," Norton said, "just to see if it's worthwhile. If the result of the study says it's not a bad idea, then we'd look at it a little more closely."

"It would be almost impossible to join them all up, but there might be ways we can cut down on capital overhead. We are each

providing the same services, and we all have the same equipment. It's definitely worth looking at."

Kanzigg said the idea first surfaced two to three years ago when he was president of the Midway firefighters' union. The idea drew very little interest.

"The biggest opposition right off the bat came from the fire chiefs," Kanzigg said. "You've got three fire chiefs going, 'I want to be fire chief.' Well, now there is no opposition here. There is no power struggle, so the first obstacle has already been eliminated."

Kanzigg said mergers and consolidations were a topic of discussion at the recent Florida Fire Chief's Association meeting.

"A lot of the smaller departments can't absorb their revenue loss through other services, like a municipal department can," Kanzigg said. "So a lot of chiefs were looking into this because everything is tight these days."

At the request of the unions, the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF) will do a feasibility study free of charge. Every aspect of operation, including station locations, area needs, salaries, pen-

sions and debt, to name a few, would be scrutinized.

"Probably 50 percent of the departments that look into consolidation do not find it feasible because of things like debt and pay levels," Kanzigg said.

Still, in the era of dwindling tax bases and growing economic woes, the issue at least warrants some attention.

"I've said before, this is a new day," Midway Commission Chairman Jacques Gorris said.

"It could have big benefits to the community and taxpayers and everybody involved. If you don't look at something like that, and you don't open up the possibilities, then you are depriving the community of a benefit they might be able to enjoy in the future."

"Bottom-line, the best thing we can do right now is be good stewards with the money we have and the privileges we've been given to serve the community, then partner with people who are like-minded and want to do great things in the most efficient way that we can and get the most services for that."
